Poop Sleuth

Book: *Poop-Eating Animals* **Series:** Weird Animal Diets **Level:** Beacon

Objective

To help students fill in the blanks on a worksheet with details from a text about poop-eating animals.

Supplies

- Poop-Eating Animals book
- Poop Sleuth worksheet (attached)

Before the Activity

Print out the Poop Sleuth worksheet for each student. Then, read through the *Poop-Eating Animals* book, or assign it to student to read on their own.

Activity

Pass out the Poop Sleuth worksheets. Explain that the *Poop-Eating Animals* book has many facts about animals that eat poop to survive. Students should write the name of an animal in each blank to make each statement correct. If students need help, they can look back at the book. Some answers are in the book's main text, but others are in fun facts or other special features.

Evaluation

Collect the worksheets at the end of class. Use the attached answer key to give students 1 point for each correct answer, for a total of up to 10 points.

This lesson may be used to address the Common Core State Standards' reading standards for informational text, grade 3 (RI 3.1).
